

## STUDENT HIV/AIDS RESEARCH DAY 2011 ORGANISING COMMITTEE

Dr. Lucie Cluver is a University Lecturer in Evidence-Based Social Intervention, and



a Fellow of Wolfson College. She trained as a social worker, and has practiced in South Africa and the U.K. Her research interests are in the impacts on children of AIDS-orphanhood and parental AIDS-illness, particularly mental health, physical health and educational outcomes.

Current projects include a 4-year longitudinal study of mental health amongst 1200 AIDS-orphaned children and other children in Cape Town, with Cape Town Child Welfare Society (<a href="www.helpkids.org.za">www.helpkids.org.za</a>). Dr Cluver is working with the South African National Departments of Social Development, Health and Education on the 'Young Carers Project': a national survey of 6000 children and 2600 caregivers to determine health and educational impacts of caring for an AIDS-sick caregiver (<a href="www.youngcarers.org.za">www.youngcarers.org.za</a>). Other

projects include a cluster randomised controlled trial of psychosocial intervention for orphans and vulnerable children in Mpumalanga, with the University of Witwatersrand and Soul City.

Dr Cluver has acted as a scientific advisor to UNICEF, the WHO, and the South African National Action Committee for Children Affected by AIDS (NACCA). She leads the

Centre for AIDS Interdisciplinary Research at Oxford (CAIRO). She speaks terrible Zulu and has a bad habit of missing flights.

**Dr. Mark Boyes** joined Wolfson College as a Junior Research Fellow in 2010. His PhD research (completed at the University of Western Australia) examined individual differences in stress reactivity and coping. Mark is currently working with Dr Lucie Cluver on the 'Young Carers' project (<a href="www.youngcarers.org.za">www.youngcarers.org.za</a>), a collaboration between the University of Oxford, the South African Government, and various NGOs. The 'Young Carers' project examines the impact of caring for a parent or guardian with HIV/AIDS on



children's physical and mental health, social development, and educational outcomes. Longitudinal follow up will explore potential mechanisms through which caring for an unwell parent or guardian may influence child wellbeing.



**Dr. Anne L'lanziva** is a Kenyan medical doctor who has been working in the HIV field for about 5 years, in clinical management of patients and in a Kenyan CDC funded program on HIV program management involving strengthening the Ministry of Health's systems in HIV program work. She has seen the effect HIV/AIDS can have on families from my own family and on families affected and infected with HIV. Anne is therefore committed to improving the quality of life of patients infected by HIV and easing the burden on families. She is really looking forward to cure of HIV so that millions of innocent deaths can be averted.

**Ciara Williams** moved from Canada in September 2011 to study University of Oxford's MSc in Evidence Based Social Intervention in the department of Social Policy and Intervention. Ciara is interested meditation-based interventions, particularly in the areas of education and mental health. Ciara is a registered Social Worker and has worked in HIV/AIDS education.

As a current MSc. in Global Health Science student and future research physician, Ishan wants to improve access to culturally competent care for marginalized communities in developing nations.

At medical school, she worked with local caregivers in Mzuzu, Malawi, to provide clinical care to HIV positive patients in rural settings and worked in voluntary testing and counselling clinics. In Uganda, she participated in a HIV/Malaria education initiative targeting school children ravaged by civil war and poverty. Working within the challenging context of civil war deepened her practical understanding of government priorities and the role of International aid. Participating in a model parliament to discuss the EU's role in combating infectious diseases further deepened her insight into the

challenges posed by HIV globally.



As a junior doctor at Kings College Hospital, Sahar witnessed the multifaceted impact of HIV on her patients and colleagues. Ethical issues were prevalent on the wards and led to multidisciplinary meetings tackling delicate issues such as that of a pregnant HIV positive lady declining ARVs. Sahar is currently studying Global Health Sciences at the University Of Oxford with a view to contribute to research into prevention of mother to child transmission of the virus.
